PALO ALTO REMEMBERED

*A new history book recalls the
city's colorful spirit.*

Tales from the colorful history of Palo Alto are showcased in a new publication from the Palo Alto Historical Association (PAHA). *Palo Alto Remembered: Stories from a City's Past*, by Matt Bowling, is a collection of 43 short stories covering local history from the early days through the end of the 20th century, noting changing times, conflicts, and notable citizens. A skillful storyteller, Bowling breathes life into the people and happenings that have made Palo Alto a special place—from skating at The Winter Lodge to the days when the circus came to Palo Alto. He recounts the old Palo Alto Drive-In Movie Theater, the closure of Cubberley High School, the Japanese Internment, the advent of the Oregon Expressway, JFK's Stanford days, the Grateful Dead, and much more. All stories are illustrated with photos from the PAHA archives, and many previously appeared in the *Palo Alto Daily News* during the years 2007 – 2008.

Bowling is an historian, former second-grade teacher in Palo Alto, and founder of the Palo Alto civics program for kids call Kidizens. He is also the author of two short books on Palo Alto history, *Nice Day for a Stroll* and the forthcoming *Palo Alto History for Kids*.
